FINDING CHRIST IN A PANDEMIC!

Pope Francis reminded us in his Message for World Mission Sunday last week that even in the current Covid-19 crisis we can encounter Christ, hear His call and respond to that call by reaching out in prayer and in solidarity with each other. During the week, when talking with the Bishop and some other clergy, we noted that although the pandemic has had such negative effects upon us as individuals, as communities and as a society, it had also brought about some very positive effects: The silence of lockdown, the pausing of frantic lives, the time spent alone and the time spent together in families, a renewed and explicit appreciation of the need for each other, for relationships and for someone greater than ourselves to whom we can turn and in whom we can trust. At times we may have experienced doubts, but at other times renewed and deepened our faith and our life of prayer. The inability to attend Mass, and the difficulties, worries and regulations even now, has made so many of us thirst in a way we may not have done so before for the Sacraments. Perhaps for some, the notion of obligation has given way to a real desire for Sunday Mass and for the gathering of the community of which we are apart. For others the availability of seeing and hearing Mass on-line has helped us to reconnect with the Church at our own speed, and without having to summon up the courage physically to enter the Church after so long. That re-entry will, I hope, be a little easier when the time comes.

This last Thursday, despite the vagaries of internet connections, we successfully launched a new way of reaching out in prayer together, with offering of a Mass that was 'zoomed'. It allowed those who joined to participate in a way that the normal live-streaming does not, not only hearing the Mass but being able to respond and to be heard to respond by me and all those others who joined. It enabled someone other than me to read, to pray and afterwards to chat and 'meet' with fellow parishioners not seen since March. It was encouraging experience as it felt more like the 'gathering' at a public Mass celebrated in Church. It was appreciated by all concerned and so we will repeat it on a fortnightly basis at 12noon on Thursday, alternating with the public Mass in Chruch for those who are shielding. However, despite this, or perhaps because of it, the inability to give and to receive Holy Communion felt even more dissonant and painful. Neither streaming nor zooming can really replace Mass and Holy Communion, but they are useful crutches in the meantime. I thanks God for these new experiences, but I so look forward to being all together again when the pandemic is over and it is safe for all of us do so once more.

THE WORD OF GOD MATTHEW 22:34-40

34 When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees they got together 35 and, to disconcert him, one of them put a question, 36 'Master, which is the greatest commandment of the Law?' 37 Jesus said, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. 38 This is the greatest and the first commandment. 39

The second resembles it: You must love your neighbour as yourself. 40 On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also.'

Other readings: Exodus 22:20-26 Psalm 17 (18) 1 Thessalonians 1:5-10

REFLECTION

Jesus' discussions with the religious leaders in Jerusalem continue in this gospel passage. The question about the law is asked according to this evangelist in order to 'disconcert' Jesus. The reply is Jesus' own summary of what the law of God requires, and it has become accepted as a brief expression of the whole moral law. His reply leaves them without anything to say. If we return to the ancient expression of the law of God in the Ten Commandments we find no explicit reference to love of God and love of neighbour. Jesus draws together all the commandments under these two headings. What does Jesus mean by love? Love of God is our grateful response to the love shown by God throughout the history of salvation. Love of neighbour is illustrated in our first reading, from the book of Exodus, with its explicit instructions from the law about caring for those in need, the stranger, the widow, the orphan. Our actions must be guided by concern for the real good of others, and an awareness of their needs. We may notice that Jesus does not refer to the love he himself shows. It is not until the Gospel of John, with its profound reflection on the actions of Jesus, that we hear Jesus saying: 'Love one another as I have loved you.' (John 13:34) It is in his self-giving death on the cross that his love comes to a climax. This supreme act of love is the model for the love Christians must show. The love shown by the Son of God in going to his death, which is present for us in the Eucharist, draws us into deeper love, for God and for neighbour. St Paul continues in the first letter to the Thessalonians to praise their Christian witness. Their lives, which have been renewed by faith, have drawn others to the gospel. 'The news of your faith in God has spread everywhere! writes Paul. They now live in expectation of the return of the risen Christ.

Do I attempt to follow Christ's commands of love in my daily life?

Do I endeavour to imitate in some way the self-giving love of Christ?

We thank God for the new law of love.

We pray for all Christians whose example gives us encouragement.

'ZOOMED' MASS!

By using zoom this would enable us to feel even more a part of our parish community by at least seeing and, if practical, talking to each other. The only requirement that would be needed is to download 'Zoom' to your computer, tablet or smart phone and to let Father Mark have your email address.

Ensuring Safety at Mass in the Cold Months Ahead

THANKS I would like to thank all of those who have sought to ensure that we can gather for Mass and use our Church for private prayer as safely as possible. To those dedicated volunteers who have cleaned and continue to clean and sanitise our buildings and who provide the stewarding that is required, I offer not only my won gratitude, but also that of all who have used the Church.

CONTINUE TO BE OPEN FOR MASS At present, it is envisaged that we will continue with the present and be able to gather for Mass and the other Sacraments on both Sundays and weekdays in line with Government regulations and those of our Bishops.

HEATING & AIR-FLOW An issue has arisen however as the temperatures fall. Heating is clearly going to be increasingly necessary as we progress towards winter. Accordingly the heating will be turned on for 30 minutes before and during each Mass. In our review of the Risk Assessment for our buildings, it was decided that given the height of the ceiling and the volume of air, we will can close the windows of the Church, but will ensure that the main doors continue to be open and a flow of air ensure by keeping the Sacristy doors and windows open. When Mass begins the glass doors from the Narthex will be closed, but as the gallery is open to both main door and narthex the flow of air will be maintained. In this way we can 'responsibly' justify heating on both economic and 'green' fronts and for the health and well-being of us all. However, I would still recommend wearing a warm coat as temperatures will not be what we are used to in Church!

DIGITAL TEMPERATURE CHECKS In addition, we have been provided with a digital thermometer, and so will be conducting temperature checks on people as they enter the building for Mass. I hope you don't mind this simple and non-intrusive additional safeguard which seeks to ensure that no-one with possible symptoms enters the Church when we gather.

THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER

We begin afresh each year as an affirmation of our continuing love and remembrance.

On All Souls Day I would encourage you to come to Mass if you can, and given the current pandemic restrictions, will be offering public Mass at both 9am and 7pm at Our Lady of Pity. It will be possible to light votive candles in remembrance of the dead as you enter the Church and are taken to your place. Please remember to pray also for those who have no one else to pray for them.
