COME HOLY SPIRIT!

In the Garden of Eden, when our first parents turned from God by eating of the 'forbidden fruit' they experienced, for the first time, shame and guilt and fear of God. The pride encouraged by the serpent, blinded Adam and Eve to love of God, His providence, care and presence with them. God's love was unrequited!

God, however, did not abandon the human race, but sought to reawaken their love by being faithful in His love towards them, patiently, slowly but surely, revealing Himself to them once more in and through the history of His chosen people, Israel. In the fulness of time, His only-begotten Son, takes human flesh to Himself and becomes our brother. As our brother, He stands with us, lives among us, and reveals His love in a manner which makes us wonder in awe, but in a manner we can see, touch and hear with our senses and grasp in our minds. That love is manifested in its dramatic fulness in His embracing of suffering and death for our sake. Our sinfulness cannot thwart the love of God. Our sinfulness is overcome by that love—it shows itself weak even when it appears to have vanguished the life of Christ Himself. Jesus is raised from the dead! 'He is risen indeed! Alleluia!'

After reassuring His followers, manifesting the life of God, He returns to heaven to prepare a place for us, so that where He, our head has gone before, we can hope to follow.

Today, He poured out upon the Church, His Holy Spirit, and so draws us into hat relationship with God, that intimacy with our Creator that was lost in the Garden of Eden! It is the love of God that is poured out upon us now. It is not simply revealed to us, but we are immersed in it, just as surely as we are immersed in the waters of the Font. In the gift of the Spirit, we are sharing in the life of God Himself, we are part of that community of love—'through Him and with Him and in Him.'

This is where God places us; in the heart of His love. But like Adam and Eve, we are free to reject it and subject ourselves to the futility of life 'out in the cold'. Equally though, we are also free to accept it, and live, like Our Lady, 'full of grace'.



Building Bridges between the Roman Catholic Diocese of East Anglia and Battambang Prefecture

Then the Khmer Rouge Came by Marie-Madeleine Kenning

What is it like to visit a twin parish? How do you build a relationship with people so far away living in very different conditions from your own? And, in the case of Cambodia, what happened to people under the Khmer Rouge and how has it impacted their life?

These three questions prompted Marie-Madeleine Kenning, from St Mary's, Ipswich, to write Then the Khmer Rouge Came, drawing on her personal experience of making regular visits to the parishes of Battambang and Chomnaom.

PREPARING TO RE-OPEN OUR CHURCHES

Although dates have been proposed by HM Government for the phased re-opening of our schools, markets, car show-rooms, and other non-essential retail premises, no date has yet been proposed for the re-opening of places of worship. However, Cardinal Nichols, along with his fellow faith leaders have been working as part of an official government task force planning for this important step back to a more normal way of live for us all. It is to be expected that as an initial stage, our churches will be open for private prayer rather than for the public celebration of the Liturgy.

Bishop Alan has written to Parish Priests this week, indicating some of the preparations we need to make in our parishes in advance of re-opening. Although we do not have a date as yet, it is important that we make the requisite preparations in order to demonstrate to the Government and to reassure ourselves, that a re-opening can be done safely and our buildings used in such a manner as to respect the need for continued social-distancing and good and effective hygiene regimes.

The first stage is a deep clean of our buildings. Although the Parish Rooms would not be opened initially, I would envisage that we take the opportunity to include them along with the Church building itself. I need volunteers to perform this task, and will, of course, wield cleaning materials myself. The clean would have to be done in stages, with named tasks allocated to a team of no more than two people in the building at any one time. Gloves and masks would need to be worn, and cleaning materials would be provided. I have received clear instructions on what needs to be done.

The second stage is to prepare the building in such a way that enables observation of social-distancing and hygiene regulations: a one way system of entering and exiting, the roping-off of some benches to ensure people sit sufficiently apart from one another, the placing of hand sanitisers and signage to remind people of the rules to be observed and the number of people allowed in the church at any one time, and a rota and system of DAILY cleansing of those areas open to the public.

The third stage is to decide upon opening hours, and to ensure that there is oversight of visitors during these times: ensuring that only the appropriate number of people enter at any one time and that people are using the hand sanitisers etc.

As I have said, at present we do not have a date on which we will be able to open, but if we make the preparations now, it will ensure that when that date is announced we are ready and able to take advantage of it.

Accordingly I would like to ask your help in the following ways:

- Setting up of a Parish Council Sub-Committee of 6 PPC members volunteering to work with me to co-ordinate our preparations.
- 2. **Volunteers to assist as part of a team in the deep clean of the Church** and Parish Rooms. As we would only be able to work in groups of two at a time, it

THE WORD OF GOD JOHN 20:19-23

19 In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' 20 and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, 21 and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you. 'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.' 22 After

REFLECTION

This gospel reading for the feast of Pentecost has already been read, in a more extended form, on the Second Sunday of Easter. It was read then to include Jesus' encounter with Thomas 'eight days later'. On the feast of Pentecost we have the opportunity to focus on the earlier verses, in which Jesus brings the gift of peace and the gift of the Holy Spirit. The account of the day of Pentecost is found in our first reading, from the second chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. Fifty days after the resurrection there was a spectacular manifestation of the power of the Spirit. Jews and proselytes, gathered from the nations for the Jewish feast of Pentecost, witness the power of the Spirit and hear the preaching of the apostles each in his own tongue. This event launches the mission to the whole world. Our gospel teaches that the Holy Spirit was also given by the risen Christ before the events of Pentecost. This is a guieter and more intimate demonstration of the power of the Spirit. It is related to the preaching of forgiveness and the possibility of new life for those who ask for it. The disciples are empowered to bring the forgiveness of Christ, but it is possible for people to reject this forgiveness. This seems to be the sense of the final verse, that some have their sins retained. This is the final day of the Easter period. The Lord who died on the cross has shown himself in his risen body. He has taken our humanity into the presence of the Father. He is no longer visibly present, but his Spirit is with us to remind us of Jesus and to lead us into all truth. That Spirit, as St Paul writes to the Corinthians, bestows gifts in abundance for the benefit of the whole Church.

Do I allow the Holy Spirit to transform my life?

Do I seek the peace and forgiveness offered to me through prayer and the sacraments?

Pray for the whole church, that Christians everywhere will be enlivened by the Holy Spirit.

Pray that the Easter gifts of Christ will always be with us.
